

Mixed questions and answers using ‘And you?’, ‘What about’, long answers, short answers, ‘too’ and ‘either’

The following is a random selection of questions that introduce the use of **‘too’** and **‘either’** as adverbs. This fluency exercise also helps students practice previous question forms, so students can use a variety of short answers, such as **‘Yes I am’**, **‘No I’m not’**, **Yes it is**, **No it isn’t**, etc.

1. I am a man. And you? - ***I am a man too.***
2. I’m not a man/woman. And you? - ***I’m not a man/woman, either***
3. You’re not [nationality]. And me? - ***You’re not [nationality], either***
4. You are [nationality]. And me? - ***You’re [nationality].***
5. I don’t speak [language]. And you? – ***I don’t speak [language] either.***
6. I’m a teacher? And you?
